## **Executive Order 2020-153 - Facial Covering Requirement**

On July 17, 2020, Governor Whitmer issued Executive Order 2020-153, clarifying and expanding the July 10 Executive Order 2020-147, which mandated the use of face coverings, and forbids businesses from providing service or entry to individuals who are not wearing face coverings.



Any individual that leaves his/her home **must wear a face covering** in the following situations:

- a. When in any indoor public space;
- b. When **outdoors** and **unable to consistently maintain a distance of six feet or more** from individuals who are not members of their household; and
- c. When waiting for or riding on public transportation, while in a taxi or ridesharing vehicle, or when using a private car service as a means of hired transportation.

However, while encouraged, the requirement to wear a face covering <u>does not</u> apply to individuals in the following situations:

- a. Are younger than five years old (though children two years old and older are strongly encouraged to wear a face covering);
  - b. Cannot medically tolerate a face covering;
  - c. Are eating or drinking while seated at a food service establishment;
  - d. Are exercising when wearing a face covering would interfere with the activity;
- e. Are receiving a service for which temporary removal of the face covering is necessary;
- f. Are entering a business or are receiving a service and are asked to temporarily remove a face covering for identification purposes;
- g. Are communicating with someone who is deaf, deafblind, or hard of hearing and where the ability to see the mouth is essential to communication:
- h. Are actively engaged in a public safety role, including but not limited to law enforcement, firefighters, or emergency medical personnel;
  - i. Are officiating at a religious service; or
  - j. Are giving a speech for broadcast or an audience.

Importantly, any business or government office that is open to the public must:

• Not provide service to a customer or allow a customer to enter its premises, unless the customer is wearing a face covering; and

- Post signs at all entrances instructing customers of their legal obligation to wear a face covering while inside.

• A business <u>may not assume</u> that someone who enters the business without a face covering falls in one of the exceptions specified in (a) - (j) above, including the exception for individuals who cannot medically tolerate a face covering. However, a business may accept a customer's verbal representation that they are not wearing a face covering because they fall within a specified exception.

A business licensee who is found to have violated this Executive Order may have its license temporarily suspended. For individuals, a willful violation is a misdemeanor subject to a fine of \$500 (without term of confinement).
